**G. F. WHISNANT**

Bald Knob was shocked to learn of the death of G. F. Whisnant, Saturday April 1st 1922. He passed away peacefully at 3:25 p. m. at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Myrtle Stillwell. He was buried in the Shady Grove Cemetary Sunday. The burial service at the Methodist church, of which he had been a member for over thirty years, were conducted by the Rev. C. W. Wade and Fredonia Lodge A. F. & A. M., of which he was the oldest living member. The funeral was attended by a large number of relatives, Masons and friends made during his 63 years residence in White county.

G. F. Whisnant was born close to the famous Revolutionary War, Kings Mountain, in North Carolina, September 2, 1834, so was in his 89th year and up until a few days ago was able to be around town as spry as many men of sixty. Until two years ago he read without glasses.

Mr. Whisnant came to White County, Arkansas, from Mississippi in 1859 and has been a resident of this county continuously ever since except for the four years spent in the service of the Lost Cause. He enlisted in the first company formed at Searcy and on July 4th, 1861 the company started on the march to Pocohontas where Camp Shaver had been established and became Co. K, of the celebrated Seventh Arkansas under Colonel, afterwards General Robt. Shaver.

The Seventh joined the expedition led by Generals Price and Ben McCulloch into Missouri, taking part in the battle of Wilson Creek and the skirmishes that led to the three days battle of Pea Ridge, where the Seventh Regiment under fighting Bob covered themselves with glory.

Soon after the command was transferred across the Mississippi, M. Whisnant was a prisoner in a hospital with typhoid fever when the battle of Shiloh was fought. He escaped soon after and rejoined his command soon after the fall of Fort Donains and took part in all battles of the Atlantic campaign. On Gen. Hood relieving Gen. Joe Johnston and starting his Tennessee campaign Mr. Whisnant with the old Seventh marched north to take part in the battle of Franklin, Tenn., where he was severely wounded and discharged as a derelict. On recovery, he rejoined his command and took an active part until the surrender.

He returned to Searcy and in 1865 took the oath of amnesty and at once became identified with active reconstructionists.

Shortly after this he married Cynthia Snell, to which union was born three children, Susie, James and Mary Jane but his mate departed this life. After a few years he married Nancy Goad and to this union was born four children, Jesse, Ben, Joe and Myrtle all of whom are living. Mrs. Whisnant died several years ago. During his long life he had always been a kind, helpful neighbor, ready to help in any way to make the community better, or ease a rough place for a fellow creature.

When the World War came on he showed his American spirit by sending three sons into the service and entering it himself serving as a messenger for the

Government telegraph department in his 85th year. Of all the original company that mustered at Co. K's roll call with him there are but two left, Col. R. G. Chrisp of Searcy and C. A. Crisco of Bald Knob, both much younger men than Mr. Whisnant.
